WHEREAS, the existing Pottawattamie County Secondary Roads Department Annex was constructed in 1955, is beyond its useful design life and needs an estimated \$2,400,000 in renovations, and

WHEREAS, the existing Pottawattamie County Secondary Roads Fleet maintenance facility was constructed in 1977 and fails to provide adequate space for the volume of work and the size of the equipment of the Department's \$19,800,000 fleet, and

WHEREAS, the location of either building does not promote efficiency, communication, training, accessibility, or safety, and

WHEREAS, the estimated efficiencies created by the Secondary Roads Facility Plan provides for a 1.52 Return on Investment based on a 50 year design life of the new construction with the cost of the improvements recovered in approximately 34 years and an additional \$5,100,000 in estimated savings may be realized by the 50th year of the intended design life of the proposed buildings, and

WHEREAS, notice of hearing on plans, specifications, form of contract and estimate of cost for the public improvements **was** published as required by law, and

WHEREAS, the plans, specifications, form of contract and estimate of cost were approved following a public hearing by the Board of Supervisors for the construction of the public improvements described in general as the Pottawattamie County Secondary Roads Operations Center public improvement; and

WHEREAS, the project shall be let for construction with bids to be opened at 2:00 P.M. on September 13, 2022 at the office of the Architect, HGM Associates located at 640 5th Ave, Council Bluffs, IA 51501 with a recommendation for award at the September 20, 2022 Board of Supervisors meeting.




Program Overview





RESOLUTION NO. 47-2022

Resolution Authorizing Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement with Regional Water

- **WHEREAS**, Chapter 15A of the Code of Iowa ("Chapter 15A") declares that economic development is a public purpose for which a county may provide grants, loans, guarantees and other financial assistance to or for the benefit of private persons; and
- **WHEREAS**, Chapter 15A requires that before public funds are used for grants, loans or other financial assistance, the board of supervisors must determine that a public purpose will reasonably be accomplished by the spending or use of those funds; and
- **WHEREAS,** Chapter 15A requires that, in determining whether funds should be spent, the board of supervisors must consider any or all of a series of factors; and
- WHEREAS, Regional Water has proposed to undertake certain improvements and extensions (the "Water Improvement Project") to its water system in order to serve certain property (the "Development Property") situated in Pottawattamie County, Iowa (the "County"); and
- WHEREAS, the Water Improvement Project is necessary to provide water service to the Development Property and to promote the development of residential housing thereon (the "Housing Development Project"); and
- WHEREAS, Regional Water has requested that the County provide financial assistance in the form of a forgivable loan (the "Forgivable Loan") in order to pay for a portion of the costs of the Water Improvement Project; and
- WHEREAS, the County and Regional Water have entered into a certain forgivable loan agreement (the "Original Forgivable Loan Agreement") in connection with the Water Improvement Project and the Forgivable Loan; and
- WHEREAS, it is now necessary to amend the Original Forgivable Loan Agreement in order to extend the completion date of the Water Improvement Project and to extend the maturity date of the Forgivable Loan; and
- WHEREAS, an amended forgivable loan agreement (the "Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement") has been prepared to set forth the new understanding between the County and Regional water; and
- **WHEREAS**, it is now necessary to take action for the approval of the Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement and to make provision for the execution and delivery thereof;
- **NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED** by the Board of Supervisors of Pottawattamie County, Iowa, as follows:
- Section 1. Pursuant to the factors listed in Chapter 15A, the Board of Supervisors hereby finds and reaffirms that:
 - a) The Housing Development Project, including the Water Improvement Project, will add diversity and generate new opportunities for the Pottawattamie County and Iowa economies; and
 - b) The Housing Development Project, including the Water Improvement Project, will generate public gains and benefits, particularly in the creation of new jobs, income and housing opportunities in the County, which are warranted in comparison to the amount of the proposed Forgivable Loan.
- Section 2. The Board of Supervisors further finds and reaffirms that a public purpose will reasonably be accomplished by making the Forgivable Loan in connection with the Water Improvement Project.
- Section 3. The Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement is hereby approved, and the Chairperson of the Board of Supervisors and the County Auditor are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement on behalf of the County, in substantially the form and content in which the Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement has been presented to this Board of Supervisors. Such officers, and their designees, are also authorized to make such changes, modifications, additions or deletions as they, with the advice of bond counsel, may believe to be necessary, and to take such actions as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of the Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement.

Section 4. All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed, to the extent of such conflict.

AMENDED FORGIVABLE LOAN AGREEMENT

This Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement is entered into between Pottawattamie County, Iowa (the "County") and Regional Water as of the _____ day of ______, 2022 (the "Commencement Date").

WHEREAS, Regional Water, an Iowa Nonprofit Corporation ("Regional Water"), is authorized and empowered by Iowa Code Chapter 504 (the "Act") to issue notes or bonds for any corporate purpose; and

WHEREAS, Regional Water has proposed to undertake certain improvements and extensions (the "Water Improvement Project") to its water system (the "System") in order to serve certain property (the "Development Property") situated in Pottawattamie County, Iowa (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, the Water Improvement Project is necessary to provide water service to the Development Property and to promote the development of residential housing thereon; and

WHEREAS, Regional Water has requested that the County provide financial assistance in the form of a forgivable loan (the "Forgivable Loan") in order to pay for a portion of the costs of the Water Improvement Project; and

WHEREAS, the County and Regional Water entered into a certain Forgivable Loan Agreement dated July 15, 2021 ("Original Forgivable Loan Agreement"), with respect to the Water Improvement Project and the Forgivable Loan; and

WHEREAS, it is now necessary to amend the Original Forgivable Loan Agreement in order to extend the completion date of the Water Improvement Project and to extend the maturity date of the Forgivable Loan; and

WHEREAS, this Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement (the "Agreement") has been prepared to set forth the updated, mutual understanding between the County and Regional Water and to replace the Original Forgivable Loan Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A of the Code of Iowa authorizes counties to provide grants, loans, guarantees, tax incentives and other financial assistance to or for the benefit of private persons;

NOW, THEREFORE, Regional Water and the County agree as follows:

A. Regional Water's Covenants.

1. <u>Water Improvement Project.</u> Regional Water agrees to cause the construction of the Water Improvement Project in accordance with the timeline and specifications set forth on Exhibit A hereto. The construction of the Water Improvement Project shall minimally include the construction of certain water pipeline improvements with the capacity to serve five hundred (500) single-family homes in the County. Regional Water agrees to achieve substantial completion of the Water Improvement Project by no later than November 1, 2024 and final completion by no later than December 15, 2024.

Prior to constructing the Water Improvement Project, Regional Water will submit copies of all engineering documents related to the proposed Water Improvement Project to the County for review. The County may request reasonable changes in such documents, to ensure compliance with the requirements of this Agreement.

2. <u>Forgivable Loan.</u> Regional Water agrees that the County will advance the proceeds (the "Forgivable Loan Proceeds") of the Forgivable Loan in the amount of \$300,000 to Regional Water in accordance with Section B.1 of this Agreement. Regional Water further agrees that the County will not advance any Forgivable Loan Proceeds until this Agreement has been executed in-full and Regional Water has delivered the Promissory Note (as hereinafter defined) to the County.

Regional Water agrees to apply the Forgivable Loan Proceeds to the payment and/or reimbursement of the costs of the Water Improvement Project.

Regional Water's obligation to repay the Forgivable Loan shall be evidenced by a promissory note (the "Promissory Note") to be executed by Regional Water and delivered to the County. The Promissory Note shall be in substantially the form as set forth on Exhibit B hereto.

Unless sooner forgiven in accordance with the terms of this Agreement or made subject to acceleration in accordance with Section A.8 of this Agreement, all principal advanced under the Forgivable Loan, and accrued interest thereon, shall be due and owing to the County at the office of the County Auditor by Noon on March 15, 2025. The Forgivable Loan shall bear interest at the rate of 1.50% per annum calculated from the date of the Promissory Note. Interest shall be calculated on the basis of the actual 365-day or 366-day calendar year, whichever is appropriate.

Nothing herein shall prohibit Rural Water from forfeiting the right to loan forgiveness, as set forth in Section B.2 of this Agreement by prepaying on the Forgivable Loan at any time. All prepayments shall be applied first to accrued interest and then to outstanding principal. Prepaid principal shall cease to bear interest at the time of such prepayment.

3. <u>Loan Forgiveness Request.</u> Upon completion of the construction of the Water Improvement Project, Regional Water agrees to submit a request (the "Loan Forgiveness Request") to the County requesting that the Forgivable Loan be forgiven in accordance with Section B.2 of this Agreement.

The Loan Forgiveness Request shall be accompanied by documentation (the "Costs Documentation") detailing the <u>total</u> costs (the "Water Improvement Costs") incurred in the completion thereof, including invoices and such other documentation as is reasonably requested by the County, confirming that such Water Improvement Costs detailed in such Costs Documentation were in fact incurred in the construction of the Water Improvement Project and that such Water Improvement Costs are of an amount reasonably to have been expected with respect to such construction.

The Water Improvement Costs may include costs relating to land acquisition, planning, designing and constructing the Water Improvement Project; and other reasonably related costs of carrying out the Water Improvement Project.

The Loan Forgiveness Request shall also be accompanied by a report from the engineers for the Water Improvement Project demonstrating that the Water Improvement Project has the capacity to provide service to at least five hundred (500) single-family homes in the County.

8. Default Provisions.

- A. <u>Events of Default.</u> The following shall be an "Event of Default" under this Agreement, and the term "Event of Default" shall mean, whenever it is used in this Agreement (unless otherwise provided), any one or more of the following events:
 - I. Failure by Regional Water to complete construction of the Water Improvement Project pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
 - II. Failure by Regional Water to repay the Forgivable Loan pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
 - III. Failure by Regional Water to observe or perform any other material covenant on its part, to be observed or performed hereunder.
- B. Notice and Remedies. Whenever any Event of Default described in this Agreement occurs, the County shall provide written notice to Regional Water describing the cause of the default and the steps that must be taken by Regional Water in order to cure the default. Regional Water shall have thirty (30) days after receipt of the notice to cure the default or to provide assurances satisfactory to County that the default will be cured as soon as reasonably possible. If Regional Water fails to cure the default or provide assurances, the County shall then have the right to:
 - I. Pursue any action available to it, at law or in equity, in order to enforce the terms of this Agreement.
 - II. Accelerate the due date of the then unforgiven principal amount of the Forgivable Loan, with interest thereon, which amount shall become due and owing within 30-days of the provision of a written notice of such acceleration from the County to Regional Water without presentment, demand, protest or other notice of any kind, all of which are hereby expressly waived, anything in this Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding. In the event of acceleration of the Forgivable Loan, the provisions with respect to loan forgiveness as set forth in section B.2 of this Agreement shall not apply.

B. County's Covenants.

1. <u>Disbursement of Loan Proceeds.</u> The County hereby agrees to advance the Forgivable Loan Proceeds in the amount of \$300,000 to Regional Water within thirty (30) days of the Commencement Date of this Agreement.

2. <u>Loan Forgiveness.</u> Principal of and interest on the Forgivable Loan shall be forgiven with fifteen (15) days upon receipt from Regional Water of a satisfactory Loan Forgiveness Request.

In the event that the County determines that a Loan Forgiveness Request received from Regional Water does not meet the requirements of Section A.3 above, the County shall notify Regional Water within fifteen (15) days of such determination in order to allow an opportunity for Regional Water to cure the noted deficiencies.

The County and Regional Water have caused this Agreement to be signed, in their names and on their behalf by their duly authorized officers, all as of the day and date written above.

EXHIBIT A TIMELINE AND SPECIFICATIONS OF WATER IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Specifications

Regional Water will construct approximately 5 miles of pipeline and a pump station to provide potable water to new housing development(s) at approximately the intersection of Pioneer Trail and Dumfries Avenue in Pottawattamie County, IA. The pipeline will be installed in private easement where possible and in the public right of way where easements cannot be obtained.

PVC and ductile iron pipe materials will be used. Regional Water will construct approximately 2.5 miles of pipeline within Council Bluffs Water Works (CBWW) service territory to extend service to the metered connection point. An additional 2.5 miles of pipeline will be installed outside CBWW territory from the metered connection point to the new housing developments to be served. The pipeline will consist of a meter vault and pump station, gasketed PVC pipe where open excavation is possible, restrained-joint PVC pipe installed by horizontal directional drilling or other trenchless installation methods beneath roads or where open excavation is not feasible, mainline valves, cleanouts, fittings, etc. The pipeline will be designed and constructed according to Regional Water's standard specification for rural water pipeline construction. Pipeline installed inside CBWW's service territory will conform to CBWW standard specifications. The pipeline is only designed to supply domestic service, and not capable of providing any level of fire protection.

The pipeline will be designed to serve water to a minimum of 600 residential customers along Pioneer Trail and generally along the 240th Street corridor. The minimum number of customers served assumes an average customer peak daily water use of 360 gallons. The initial 160 services in the first two developments are included in the 600-customer capacity. Additional pipeline will be required in the future to serve any customers located north or east of the two initial developments near the intersection of Pioneer Trail and Dumfries Avenue. Additional pipeline and other future improvements are outside the scope of this Agreement. This Agreement does not obligate Regional Water to construct any pipeline or improvements other than the 5 miles of pipeline and appurtenant items described above.

The water source will be a connection to CBWW's water system near the intersection of Meadowview Parkway and Woodland Trail. The initial water delivery point(s) will be at the entrance to each new housing development. The potable water distribution system within each development will be constructed by the developer and turned over to Regional Water following completion.

Timeline

The contract documents for the pipeline construction will require the contractor to substantially complete the project on or before November 1, 2024. Substantial completion is defined by a project which operates as intended, i.e. the pipeline can convey potable water to its intended point of delivery. Miscellaneous cleanup items may remain outstanding until the final

completion deadline. The Loan Forgiveness Request may be submitted after final completion of the project. An approximate timeline for project tasks is shown below:

September 2022 – June 2023 Easement Acquisition

• September 2022 – May 2023 Pipeline & Pump Station Design

• May – June 2023 Iowa DNR plan review, Pott Co plan review

• July 2023 Project bid

• September 2023 – October 2024 Pipeline & Pump Station construction

• November 1, 2024 Substantial Completion Deadline

• December 15, 2024 Final Completion Deadline

The County has made a forgivable loan to the Borrower in the principal amount of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) (the "Forgivable Loan") under this Promissory Note (the "Note") and under a certain Amended Economic Development Loan Agreement (the "Agreement") between the County and the Borrower dated _______, 2022, and reference is hereby made to the Agreement for a more complete description of the rights and obligations of the parties hereof.

The Forgivable Loan shall be forgiven by the County in accordance with the terms set forth in the Agreement.

Payment of principal of and interest on the Forgivable Loan shall be made to the County at the Office of the County Auditor, Pottawattamie County Courthouse, Second Floor, 227 S 6th Street, Council Bluffs, Iowa 51501 by Noon on March 15, 2025, unless sooner forgiven in accordance with the Agreement. This Note shall bear interest at the rate of 1.50% per annum calculated from the date of this Note. Interest on this Note shall be calculated on the basis of the actual 365-day or 366-day calendar year, whichever is appropriate.

The Borrower reserves the right to prepay principal of this Note, in whole or in part, without penalty, at any time prior to maturity. All prepayments shall be applied first to accrued interest and then to outstanding principal. Prepaid principal shall cease to bear interest at the time of such prepayment.

In the event of a default under the Agreement which has not been cured in accordance with the terms of the Agreement, including the failure to repay principal of the Forgivable Loan under the terms of the Agreement, the Borrowers agree to pay all costs and expenses of collection, including reasonable attorney's fees. The Borrowers waive demand, presentment, notice of non-payment, protest, notice of protest and notice of dishonor.

This Note is secured, and its maturity is subject to acceleration in each case upon the terms provided in the Agreement.

The validity, construction and enforceability of this Note shall be governed by the internal laws of the State of Iowa without giving effect to the conflict of laws principles thereof.

WHEREAS, Regional Water has proposed to undertake certain improvements and extensions (the "Water Improvement Project") to its water system in order to serve certain property (the "Development Property") situated in Pottawattamie County, Iowa (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, the Water Improvement Project is necessary to provide water service to the Development Property and to promote the development of residential housing thereon (the "Housing Development Project"); and

WHEREAS, Regional Water has requested that the County provide financial assistance in the form of a forgivable loan (the "Forgivable Loan") in order to pay for a portion of the costs of the Water Improvement Project; and

WHEREAS, the County and Regional Water have entered into a certain forgivable loan agreement (the "Original Forgivable Loan Agreement") in connection with the Water Improvement Project and the Forgivable Loan; and

WHEREAS, it is now necessary to amend the Original Forgivable Loan Agreement in order to extend the completion date of the Water Improvement Project and to extend the maturity date of the Forgivable Loan; and

WHEREAS, an amended forgivable loan agreement (the "Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement") has been prepared to set forth the new understanding between the County and Regional water; and

WHEREAS, it is now necessary to take action for the approval of the Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement and to make provision for the execution and delivery thereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Pottawattamie County, Iowa, as follows:

- Section 1. Pursuant to the factors listed in Chapter 15A, the Board of Supervisors hereby finds and reaffirms that:
 - a) The Housing Development Project, including the Water Improvement Project, will add diversity and generate new opportunities for the Pottawattamie County and Iowa economies; and
 - b) The Housing Development Project, including the Water Improvement Project, will generate public gains and benefits, particularly in the creation of new jobs, income and housing opportunities in the County, which are warranted in comparison to the amount of the proposed Forgivable Loan.
- Section 2. The Board of Supervisors further finds and reaffirms that a public purpose will reasonably be accomplished by making the Forgivable Loan in connection with the Water Improvement Project.
- Section 3. The Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement is hereby approved, and the Chairperson of the Board of Supervisors and the County Auditor are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement on behalf of the County, in substantially the form and content in which the Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement has been presented to this Board of Supervisors. Such officers, and their designees, are also authorized to make such changes, modifications, additions or deletions as they, with the advice of bond counsel, may believe to be necessary, and to take such actions as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of the Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement.
- Section 4. All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed, to the extent of such conflict.

AMENDED FORGIVABLE LOAN AGREEMENT

This <u>Amended</u> Forgivable Loan Agreement is entered into between Pottawattamie County, Iowa (the "County") and Regional Water as of the ____ day of ______, 20212022 (the "Commencement Date").

WHEREAS, Regional Water, an Iowa Nonprofit Corporation ("Regional Water"), is authorized and empowered by Iowa Code Chapter 504 (the "Act") to issue notes or bonds for any corporate purpose; and

WHEREAS, Regional Water has proposed to undertake certain improvements and extensions (the "Water Improvement Project") to its water system (the "System") in order to serve certain property (the "Development Property") situated in Pottawattamie County, Iowa (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, the Water Improvement Project is necessary to provide water service to the Development Property and to promote the development of residential housing thereon; and

WHEREAS, Regional Water has requested that the County provide financial assistance in the form of a forgivable loan (the "Forgivable Loan") in order to pay for a portion of the costs of the Water Improvement Project; and

WHEREAS, the County and Regional Water entered into a certain Forgivable Loan
Agreement dated , 2021 ("Original Forgivable Loan Agreement"), with
respect to the Water Improvement Project and the Forgivable Loan; and

WHEREAS, it is now necessary to amend the Original Forgivable Loan Agreement in order to extend the completion date of the Water Improvement Project and to extend the maturity date of the Forgivable Loan; and

WHEREAS, this Amended Forgivable Loan Agreement (the "Agreement") has been prepared to set forth the updated, mutual understanding between the County and Regional Water and to replace the Original Forgivable Loan Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A of the Code of Iowa authorizes counties to provide grants, loans, guarantees, tax incentives and other financial assistance to or for the benefit of private persons;

NOW, THEREFORE, Regional Water and the County agree as follows:

A. Regional Water's Covenants.

1. <u>Water Improvement Project.</u> Regional Water agrees to cause the construction of the Water Improvement Project in accordance with the timeline and specifications set forth on Exhibit A hereto. The construction of the Water Improvement Project shall minimally include the construction of certain water pipeline improvements with the capacity to serve five hundred (500) single-family homes in the County. Regional Water agrees to achieve substantial completion of the Water Improvement Project by no later than <u>September November</u> 1, <u>20222024</u> and final completion by no later than <u>December 15</u>, 2024.

Prior to constructing the Water Improvement Project, Regional Water will submit copies of all engineering documents related to the proposed Water Improvement Project to the County for review. The County may request reasonable changes in such documents, to ensure compliance with the requirements of this Agreement.

2. <u>Forgivable Loan.</u> Regional Water agrees that the County will advance the proceeds (the "Forgivable Loan Proceeds") of the Forgivable Loan in the amount of \$300,000 to Regional Water in accordance with Section B.1 of this Agreement. Regional Water further agrees that the County will not advance any Forgivable Loan Proceeds until this Agreement has been executed in-full and Regional Water has delivered the Promissory Note (as hereinafter defined) to the County.

Regional Water agrees to apply the Forgivable Loan Proceeds to the payment and/or reimbursement of the costs of the Water Improvement Project.

Regional Water's obligation to repay the Forgivable Loan shall be evidenced by a promissory note (the "Promissory Note") to be executed by Regional Water and delivered to the County. The Promissory Note shall be in substantially the form as set forth on Exhibit B hereto.

Unless sooner forgiven in accordance with the terms of this Agreement or made subject to acceleration in accordance with Section A.8 of this Agreement, all principal advanced under the Forgivable Loan, and accrued interest thereon, shall be due and owing to the County at the office of the County Auditor by Noon on December 1 March 15, 2022 2025. The Forgivable Loan shall bear interest at the rate of 1.50% per annum calculated from the date of the Promissory Note. Interest shall be calculated on the basis of the actual 365-day or 366-day calendar year, whichever is appropriate.

Nothing herein shall prohibit Rural Water from forfeiting the right to loan forgiveness, as set forth in Section B.2 of this Agreement by prepaying on the Forgivable Loan at any time. All prepayments shall be applied first to accrued interest and then to outstanding principal. Prepaid principal shall cease to bear interest at the time of such prepayment.

3. <u>Loan Forgiveness Request.</u> Upon completion of the construction of the Water Improvement Project, Regional Water agrees to submit a request (the "Loan Forgiveness Request") to the County requesting that the Forgivable Loan be forgiven in accordance with Section B.2 of this Agreement.

The Loan Forgiveness Request shall be accompanied by documentation (the "Costs Documentation") detailing the <u>total</u> costs (the "Water Improvement Costs") incurred in the completion thereof, including invoices and such other documentation as is reasonably requested by the County, confirming that such Water Improvement Costs detailed in such Costs Documentation were in fact incurred in the construction of the Water Improvement Project and that such Water Improvement Costs are of an amount reasonably to have been expected with respect to such construction.

The Water Improvement Costs may include costs relating to land acquisition, planning, designing and constructing the Water Improvement Project; and other reasonably related costs of carrying out the Water Improvement Project.

The Loan Forgiveness Request shall also be accompanied by a report from the engineers for the Water Improvement Project demonstrating that the Water Improvement Project has the capacity to provide service to at least five hundred (500) single-family homes in the County.

8. Default Provisions.

- A. <u>Events of Default.</u> The following shall be an "Event of Default" under this Agreement, and the term "Event of Default" shall mean, whenever it is used in this Agreement (unless otherwise provided), any one or more of the following events:
 - I. Failure by Regional Water to complete construction of the Water Improvement Project pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
 - II. Failure by Regional Water to repay the Forgivable Loan pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
 - III. Failure by Regional Water to observe or perform any other material covenant on its part, to be observed or performed hereunder.
- B. <u>Notice and Remedies.</u> Whenever any Event of Default described in this Agreement occurs, the County shall provide written notice to Regional Water describing the cause of the default and the steps that must be taken by Regional Water in order to cure the default. Regional Water shall have thirty (30) days after receipt of the notice to cure the default or to provide assurances satisfactory to County that the default will be cured as soon as reasonably possible. If Regional Water fails to cure the default or provide assurances, the County shall then have the right to:
 - I. Pursue any action available to it, at law or in equity, in order to enforce the terms of this Agreement.
 - II. Accelerate the due date of the then unforgiven principal amount of the Forgivable Loan, with interest thereon, which amount shall become due and owing within 30-days of the provision of a written notice of such acceleration from the County to Regional Water without presentment, demand, protest or other notice of any kind, all of which are hereby expressly waived, anything in this Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding. In the event of acceleration of the Forgivable Loan, the provisions with respect to loan forgiveness as set forth in section B.2 of this Agreement shall not apply.

B. County's Covenants.

1. <u>Disbursement of Loan Proceeds.</u> The County hereby agrees to advance the Forgivable Loan Proceeds in the amount of \$300,000 to Regional Water within thirty (30) days of the Commencement Date of this Agreement.

2. <u>Loan Forgiveness.</u> Principal of and interest on the Forgivable Loan shall be forgiven with fifteen (15) days upon receipt from Regional Water of a satisfactory Loan Forgiveness Request.

In the event that the County determines that a Loan Forgiveness Request received from Regional Water does not meet the requirements of Section A.3 above, the County shall notify Regional Water within fifteen (15) days of such determination in order to allow an opportunity for Regional Water to cure the noted deficiencies.

The County and Regional Water have caused this Agreement to be signed, in their names and on their behalf by their duly authorized officers, all as of the day and date written above.

The County has made a forgivable loan to the Borrower in the principal amount of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) (the "Forgivable Loan") under this Promissory Note (the "Note") and under a certain <u>Amended</u> Economic Development Loan Agreement (the "Agreement") between the County and the Borrower dated ________, 20212022, and reference is hereby made to the Agreement for a more complete description of the rights and obligations of the parties hereof.

The Forgivable Loan shall be forgiven by the County in accordance with the terms set forth in the Agreement.

Payment of principal of and interest on the Forgivable Loan shall be made to the County at the Office of the County Auditor, Pottawattamie County Courthouse, Second Floor, 227 S 6th Street, Council Bluffs, Iowa 51501 by Noon on December 1 March 15, 2022 2025, unless sooner forgiven in accordance with the Agreement. This Note shall bear interest at the rate of 1.50% per annum calculated from the date of this Note. Interest on this Note shall be calculated on the basis of the actual 365-day or 366-day calendar year, whichever is appropriate.

The Borrower reserves the right to prepay principal of this Note, in whole or in part, without penalty, at any time prior to maturity. All prepayments shall be applied first to accrued interest and then to outstanding principal. Prepaid principal shall cease to bear interest at the time of such prepayment.

In the event of a default under the Agreement which has not been cured in accordance with the terms of the Agreement, including the failure to repay principal of the Forgivable Loan under the terms of the Agreement, the Borrowers agree to pay all costs and expenses of collection, including reasonable attorney's fees. The Borrowers waive demand, presentment, notice of non-payment, protest, notice of protest and notice of dishonor.

This Note is secured, and its maturity is subject to acceleration in each case upon the terms provided in the Agreement.

The validity, construction and enforceability of this Note shall be governed by the internal laws of the State of Iowa without giving effect to the conflict of laws principles thereof.

The Jack Link story is a primary example of a successful economic development project that dates back to the 1800's. When Chris Link migrated from the old country and settled in Wisconsin, he didn't bring much with him, but he did bring his family's sausage recipe. The capital investment for this project is estimated at \$55,000,000.

The Jack Link's facility currently employs 100+ with three additional Senior Maintenance Technician positions being created based on the expansion at an average wage of \$45.00 per hour.

As you know, supply chain systems are currently in a state of influx. Over the past two years, the Council Bluffs region has experienced an increased demand for land or existing facilities for warehouse distribution projects. Since Jack Link's owns a surplus of acres at their Underwood site, this makes it a prime location for continued economic development activity. In addition, expanding the road infrastructure at this site could potentially open up additional economic development projects on the 100-acres to the east which is a privately-owned parcel owned by the Welbourne family. Pottawattamie County and Advance Southwest lowa Corporation will continue to work with the City of Underwood and other utility providers regarding additional infrastructure improvements (water, sanitary, gas and electric).

Utilizing IMPLAN, an economic development modeling platform, we anticipate that during the year of construction that this project will support 458 jobs and an additional 121 jobs in the region based on the increased economic activity.

When the expansion is fully operational, IMPLAN estimates that the expansion of Jack Link's will add approximately \$1.3M to the local economy each year. This includes activity directly related to the company's operations and associated "spillover" activity.

Consenting to and approving the plans for the improvement of the extension of Secondary Road G30 (Magnolia Road) within the City of Underwood, Iowa ("City").

WHEREAS, Pottawattamie County proposes to improve Magnolia Road within the City of Underwood, lowa in accordance with plans filed in the office of the Clerk of said City as follows:

Remove and Replace Pavement and reconstruct Mosquito Creek Bridge to support turn lanes as necessitated by the Jack Links Expansion project, identified as project number <u>FM-CO78(TBD)—55-78</u>, and

- WHEREAS, the City has informed itself as to the proposed improvement and has examined the plans thereof,
- WHEREAS, the City recognizes the County will develop the project and the City supports the proposed improvements, the Jack Links Expansion, and grant applications made by the County for this project.
- WHEREAS, the City is aware that the purpose of the agreement is to apply for and secure RISE funding. Failure to receive RISE funding will terminate this agreement and future project development would require a separate agreement.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the said Council of the City of Underwood, as follows:
- The City hereby approves the plans for the said project and consents to the improvement in accordance with the plans.
- The City will take such legal steps and procedures to a conclusion such legal action and/or proceedings as are now or may hereafter be required.
 - a. To legally establish the grade lines of the street in accordance with and as shown by the project plans, and to cause any damage accruing there from to be determined and paid pursuant to lowa Code Section 364.15.
 - To take such steps as may be necessary to secure the consent to the removal of any trees that may interfere with the construction of the project.
 - To remove existing and prevent future encroachments and obstructions upon streets or highways covered by the project.
 - d. To remove or cause to be removed without expense to the County all water hydrants, curb boxes, electroliers and cables, poles, parking meters, traffic signals, and any other facilities or obstructions which interfere with the construction of the project.

All above ground utilities shall be placed as close to the right of way line as practical.

- 3. Since this project may be partly financed with Federal-aid funds, the grant of which requires that the lowa Department of Transportation (lowa DOT) and the County comply with federal laws and regulations with respect thereto, the City agrees to take such action as may be necessary to comply with such federal laws and regulations. (Approval of the plans by the City satisfies the requirements of this paragraph.)
- 4. The City further agrees that within the limits of the proposed surfacing and for one foot outside thereof where the City or utility companies may be digging ditches prior to the proposed surfacing, the City will require that all backfilling and compaction of ditches shall

be made in accordance with the lowa DOT's current Standard Specifications. The work will be subject to the approval of the County.

- 5. The City will, by ordinance, prohibit or restrict diagonal parking throughout the project.
- 6. Upon completion of the project, the City agrees that:
 - a. Any changes in the physical features of the project will be authorized only after approval has been secured from the County.
 - The City will furnish and erect all traffic signage and signaling in accordance with the current Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices.
 - c. All traffic signage and signaling shall be approved by the County before placement.

Transportation Justification Narrative Magnolia Road Reconstruction from Railroad Hwy to 265th St Pottawattamie County, Iowa

Magnolia Road between Railroad Hwy and 265th St is classified as a Major Collector. The existing paved corridor is a two-lane 24'-wide concrete section that consists of three intersections, two on/off-ramps onto I-80, five access drives, one railroad crossing, one stream crossing (Mosquito Creek), and one interstate overpass. The pavement section exhibits visible signs of moderate to significant longitudinal, transverse, and reflective cracking. Since 2011, there have been four reported crashes in front of Jack Link's, one at Mulberry Ln, three at the truck stop driveway, two at the I-80 West on/off ramp, and one at the I-80 East on/off ramp.

The existing 57-year-old 150'-0" x 28'-0" V14 standard continuous l-beam bridge over Mosquito Creek was last inspected on April 30th, 2020 and was given a structural rating of 46.8 and classified as structurally deficient. The inspection report noted that both the superstructure and substructure were in poor condition and had advanced deterioration.

The existing intersection of Magnolia Rd & Railroad Hwy currently has a skew angle of approximately 63 degrees. Although the skew angle is deemed to be acceptable, visibility issues can arise from vehicles turning left onto Railroad Hwy. Last counted in 2016, Railroad Hwy saw an AADT of 2080 and 3490 for the south and north legs, respectively, and Magnolia Rd saw an AADT of 170 and 3130 for the west and east legs, respectively. Since 2011, there have six reported crashes at or near the intersection.

The proposed project includes the reconstruction of Magnolia Rd from Railroad Hwy to 265th St, including intersections, and bridge replacement over Mosquito Creek. The project will utilize three typical sections: a 36'-wide section consisting of two 12'-wide PCC travel lanes and two 6'-wide granular shoulders; a 50'-wide section consisting of two 12'-wide PCC travel lanes, one 14'-wide PCC two-way left turn lane (TWLTL), and two 6'-wide granular shoulders; and a 30' wide granular section.

The proposed project includes realigning the intersection of Magnolia Rd & Railroad Hwy to provide a skew angle of approximately 80 degrees between the east leg of Magnolia Rd and Railroad Hwy, which meets desired criteria and will provide safer turning movements. The unpaved west leg of the intersection will be shifted north to align with the center of the intersection, but the skew angle will be maintained; the limits of the unpaved reconstruction are from approximately the edge return of 260° St to Railroad Hwy.

The proposed railroad approaches will be designed to match existing layout to minimize any potential impacts to the railroad. No impacts to any railroad equipment are expected.

Stormwater conditions will be analyzed to provide adequate sizing for entrance culverts.

A TWLTL is being proposed between the entrance to Jack Link's and the truck stop access. A preliminary traffic study was conducted to analyze the need for turn lanes into Jack Link's. The need for a left turn lane at the truck stop access could not be evaluated as there was no available turning data at the access. Below is a summary of the turn lane analysis of the traffic study:

623 North Carroll Street, Carroll, Iowa 51401

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Primary reasons for turn lanes and/or two-way left turn lanes (TWLTL) are safety or operational issues which are typically evaluated based on crash history, volume-based turn lane warrants, entrance densities and capacity level of service evaluations.

Crash history was evaluated over the 5-year period from January 2017 through December 2021 along the Magnolia Road corridor. Only five crashes occurred during this 5-year period. One was at the Jack Link's entrance, three were at the fueling station/truck stop driveway, and one was at the westbound I-80 ramp intersection. The low number of crash occurrences indicates a left turn lane is not needed to correct a crash issue.

Guidance on justification for turn lanes can be found in the lowa DOT Design Manual, Section 6A-1, Horizontal Intersection Design for Rural Two-Lane Highways. This manual provides guidelines on when to install left or right turn lanes on a two-lane highway. Additional guidance is provided in the National Cooperative Highway Research Program, NCHRP Report 457, Evaluating Intersection Improvements: An Engineering Study Guide. NCHRP 457 applies to minor arterials, collectors and most city streets. Using both of these guides, turn lane warrants were checked at the Jack Link's access using existing count data for Magnolia Road coupled with the anticipated number of trucks and automobiles created by the expansion of business. The expected operations numbers were provided by the design project manager. The volumes could justify the addition of a left turn storage/ left turn deceleration lane. The number of inbound left turns would exceed the lower threshold needed in Section 6A-1 of the Design Manual for justification of a left turn bay as the anticipated number of left turns daily is approximately 200 vehicles per day (vpd) including shift changes and the threshold would be approximately 140 vph assuming a future design year westbound volume of 1,940 vehicles per day (vpd) and using the adjustment factor for 5% trucks.

The traffic study found that a turn lane is warranted for Jack Link's based on Section 6A-1 of the lowa DOT Design Manual, so the TWLTL is being recommended to provide storage for left-turning vehicles and eliminate vehicles from stopping in the thru lane, reducing the chances of rear-end collisions and increasing the capacity of the roadway.

An acceleration lane was also considered for trucks turning eastbound out of Jack Link's. Pottawattamie County and the lowa DOT do not have definite guidelines on when to provide for acceleration lanes other than the DOT stating that they are helpful on high-volume roads where openings between through vehicles in the peak hour traffic streams are infrequent and short. Another instance where they can be helpful is where profile grades cause problems with acceleration and where truck traffic in particular might be problematic. In the preliminary traffic study, an analysis of traffic operations was performed for the peak hour and the results indicate that there would be available gaps in traffic and that the level of service to exiting Jack Link's traffic would be more than adequate. Additionally, the roadway grades east of Jack Link's are relatively flat, and an additional lane for truck acceleration would not be cost efficient, so an acceleration lane is not being recommended for the project.

Two alternative bridge designs were analyzed for the replacement of the existing bridge of Mosquito Creek. The first bridge alternative is a $184^{\prime} \times 36^{\prime}$ PPCB bridge consisting of two 12^{\prime} -wide travel lanes and two 6^{\prime} -wide paved shoulders. Since the 28^{\prime} -0" roadway width and four beam cross-section of the existing bridge make it essentially impossible to maintain two-way traffic during

construction without either an alignment shift or adding width to the replacement structure, the construction of this bridge cannot be staged to maintain traffic, and an off-site detour route would be approximately 20 miles. Therefore, a temporary bridge, although deemed to be uneconomical, would be recommended for this alternative to limit the impact of traffic during construction.

The second bridge alternative is a 184′ x 60′ PPCB bridge consisting of two 12′-wide travel lanes, one 14′-wide TWLTL, two 6′-wide paved shoulders, and one 10′-wide section for future buildout and additional width for staging. The construction of this bridge can be staged and allows for traffic to be maintained. Consequently, there would be no need for an off-site detour or temporary bridge. The benefits of this alternative include eliminating the need for an off-site detour or temporary bridge, provide desirable deceleration for traffic at Mulberry Ln and the truck stop, and allow for any future buildout.

Due to constraints related to existing right-of-way and businesses along the corridor, it has been determined that over-building the width of the replacement structure on the existing alignment to allow for staged construction is the preferred alternative. This solution has the added benefit of providing enough additional deck width to accommodate any future buildout.


To summarize, the proposed project is being recommended to include realigning the intersection of Magnolia Rd & Railroad Hwy to improve sight distances and safety for left-turning maneuvers, adding a TWLTL extending from the entrance of Jack Link's to the truck stop access to provide storage for left-turning vehicles and eliminate vehicles from stopping in the thru lane, and removing and replacing the existing structurally deficient bridge with a 184' x 60' PPCB bridge to allow for staged construction, a TWLTL, and additional deck width for future buildout.

WHEREAS, the only beneficiary of these pipelines will be those producing the carbon dioxide, those transmitting it and those storing it with no contribution to the general public.

WHEREAS, the path needed to construct the pipelines can only be achieved by enforcing Eminent Domain granted by the Iowa Utilities Board across privately held land of opposed landowners.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that while Pottawattamie County encourages business growth and development and recognizes the importance of ethanol facilities to the local economy, this particular type of pipeline should not be considered a public utility. Pottawattamie County is opposed to the use of Eminent Domain laws against private landowners as there is no benefit to general public.
