Coulthard Trustees:

The Coulthard project has come to a halt; therefore, we have released retainage for the contractors and recommend paying crop damages for the lands damaged during the construction.

The only land owners with crop damages due the construction were Brothers, and Otto. The construction required hauling borrow through the crop fields causing serious compaction and removal of topsoil on the area affected during 2021 and 2022. In 2020, easement for the borrow area was purchased, we have enclosed that letter for reference.

We met with Don Brothers, and he provided scale tickets comparing the area where crops were damaged in 2021 and 2022 to similar areas in his field. Soybeans were planted in both years. Comparing these soybeans yields of the affected area vs. the comparable area; for 2021 there was a yield loss of 54.2 bushels per acre, and for 2022 a yield loss of 39.4 bushels per acre. The work area damaged was determined in 2020 to be 6.5 acres including the scour filled area. The rest of the damaged area was within the easements purchased in 2020. Taking the loss potential yield multiplied by the number of acres, there was a loss of 609 bushels. We assumed a price of \$15.00/bushel for soybeans in line with current prices. This totals the loss at \$9,135.00. Don Brothers has requested the payments be split 75% to him and 25% to Otto to match their crop share lease agreement.

It should be noted that the area is planned to be a borrow site for the New Levee District, however, if it is not purchased for that purpose additional compensation will need to be made to break compaction and build topsoil on the site. This compensation will be discussed at a later date if need be.

Borrow Easements and 2020 Damages

Coulthard Levee District Project No.: A16.121413

Dear Board Members:

Work began on the Coulthard Levee repairs in fall of 2020. The work progressed by construction of the new ring levee outside DeSoto NWR on a new easement area purchased from Don Brothers on October 8, 2020. In December 2020, the USFWS issued a cease-and-desist letter preventing the contractor from entering the district's easements on the refuge. At that time the contractor demobilized, with the intent to return once the issues were resolved. As the project delay has extended, Don Brothers has requested that the damages to date be reported so that record is made for the early work on the project.

Final Brother's Easement Area

We have attached the map and agreement which was signed by Don and the board in October. Because the property survey had not yet been completed, the board authorized only 90% of the agreed value be paid at that time with final correction made later. That agreement split the acquisition into 2 separate pieces, one for the ring levee relocation and the second for the borrow material to be used for construction.

Ring Levee Easement - The planned ring levee easement area was 2.99 acres as shown on the map and the agreement. After the final survey, the final area of this easement was found to be 2.77 acres. Using the agreed upon \$10,000 per acre gives a value of \$27,700 of which \$26,910 was paid in 2020. We recommend the board release the remaining payment of \$790 for the ring levee easement.

Borrow Easement (Brothers) - The second easement area was purchased as a source for fill material for the ring levee repair. The agreed upon \$6,250 per acre was arrived at using the same \$10,000 per acre used for the ring levee easement, less an assumed \$250 per acre FSA CRP payment spread over 15 years.

The area proposed for acquisition was 8.60 acres, with final survey finding the easement within the Brothers property to be 8.34 acres. Using the agreed upon \$6,250 per acre gives a value of \$52,125, of which \$48,375 was paid in 2020. We recommend the board release the remaining \$3,750 be released to Don Brothers

Borrow Easement (Otto) - During the final property boundary survey, it was found that the parcel boundaries shown in the GIS data were off by approximately 45 feet in this area. Because of the rush to get the easement purchased before construction began, the final survey was completed after the borrow had been taken. This survey found that a portion of the neighboring Otto property had already been taken as borrow and the landowner should be compensated and the easement for that area purchased. The

survey found 0.46 acres of easement should be purchased from the Otto property. Assuming the same \$6,250 per acre as the Brothers property, we recommend a payment of \$2.875 be made to the owner.

During the negotiations with Don Brothers regarding the borrow area compensation, it was assumed that a CRP payment of \$250 per acre per year would be reasonable based upon other recent CRP contracts we had seen. After the agreement was signed, Don reached out to the FSA regarding payment. The per acre per year price returned by FSA was \$185 per acre per year, or \$65 per acre less than assumed. The reduction in FSA payment equates to a reduced land price of \$8,131.50 for the Brother's Property and \$448.50 for the Otto Property.

While the district is under no obligation to increase the compensation to account for the changed contract rate, we recommend that both payments be authorized to make the owners as whole as possible.

The work that was completed in the fall of 2020 largely extended beyond the easements held by the district, which is normal for drainage work in Iowa. The remedy is the payment of crop damages for lands outside the easement. The value of those damages will be set during the completion hearing at the end of the project. Because the end date is unknown at this time, Don has requested that we report the acres damaged to date to make the record clear for that hearing.

The work in the Fall of 2020 began after crop-out and so all damages for 2020 will be related to compaction and restoration. The attached map shows the area found to be disturbed by the work in 2020, totaling 20.28 acres of cropland. Of the total, all but 5.85 acres are within existing or newly purchased easements and are not eligible for crop damages. The remaining 5.85 acres is divided between both Don Brothers (5.48 acres) and the Otto property (0.37 acres) and will be considered for damage compensation at the completion hearing at the end of the project.

The cease-and-desist letter abruptly ended all work at the Coulthard levee. Because of the suddenness of the shut-down, and the belief that the issues would be resolved before the 2021 planting season, final grading was not completed on the Brothers property. To make the property farmable for the 2021 crop year, Olson Contracting was engaged to restore the site. The total cost of the restoration is \$15,355.00 as shown on the attached invoice.

Without this restoration, two landowners would be asked to bear the brunt of the costs for delays caused by the FWS cease and desist. We recommend these costs be paid by the district to remove that financial burden from the landowner

To summarize the costs listed above, we recommend the following schedule of payments be made at this time:







We have been in contact with Dan Braddock of SNC Contractors. SNC is a subcontractor on a road project in Nebraska and are seeking a location to dispose of waste excavation from the project. As part of our initial discussion, SNC would deliver the material to three separate stockpile locations spread along the length of the project, shown on the maps attached.

Cost Analysis of Imported Material

The district is in need of approximately 292,000 CY of fill as shown in the November 15, 2022 opinion of probable costs. In that estimate, the total cost of fill was estimated at \$3,047,507 (2,622,507 Fill Transport, \$425,000 Borrow Area Acquisition) or \$10.44 per cubic yard.

The tentative agreement with SNC is for \$8.05 per cubic yard of fill delivered, but there will still be some transport cost from the stockpiles to the levee, some additional local borrow to serve as a buffer against running short, rental of the stockpile areas and roadway maintenance and damages. A summary of those costs is shown below:

These costs work out to \$9.44 per cubic yard with sufficient excess quantity to ensure material does not run short during the project. The total shown includes 54,000 CY totaling \$515,700 at the request of one landowner, to make the landside slope of the levee on their land farmable. This situation will be discussed in a separate report which will be submitted shortly.

Additional Benefits of Imported Material

In addition to the lower per yard cost of this imported material there are several additional benefits which make this the preferred option over relying solely upon local borrow material.

Locks in the Majority of Transportation Costs – The transportation costs listed in the November estimate are approximate only and will vary from those values shown. The variation in the actual bid numbers will be higher with longer distances. Loading trucks from the stockpiles as proposed will be easier than digging shallow lifts out of the earth and with the distributed nature of the sites, the delivery runs to throughout the levee length will be reduced, greatly reducing the final delivery costs.

More Uniform Material – the imported material will come from the hills around Blair. The soils in those hills will naturally be more uniform than the random soils deposited over many centuries at the project site. This consistency will make all aspects of construction simpler and more uniform.

Less Weather Dependent – The high-water table in the project area has limited the available quantity of borrow available on both the Vanman and Coulthard projects before. This imported material will be place on upland and stockpiled above ground, meaning the site will stay drier and the material will require less drying when deposited on the levee.

Guaranteed Quantity – The borrow areas presented in the report assumed a sufficiently low water table to maximize available fill material. It was known at the time of the hearing that the project would have narrow margins due to the available borrow quantity. The November estimate assumed the use of 100,000 CY of material from the dredging of Noble's Lake. It has since been learned that dredging is not planned, requiring sourcing of alternate material. The lowa DNR has not responded to our inquiries of available material. If these IDNR sites did not come to fruition, it would be necessary to track down and purchase other borrow sites, the distance to which are unknown. All of these alternate sites would have been random fill soils and a poorer alternative than the fill material proposed in this report.

Funding Deadline – \$2,001,017.00 of the funding (RIIF) provided by the state to the C&R Levee must be spent by June 30, 2023, or be lost to the district. Without this proposed import effort, a progress deadline would be necessitated in the larger construction contract. Contractors would increase their bid prices to cover the risks associated with not completing the necessary work by June 30th. The purchase of necessary ROW and the import costs will expend the required \$2M and remove pressure from the primary contractor, lowering costs later in the project.

We have requested review of the plan by USACE and will procure the necessary storm water permits if this work is approved. We have copied both county engineers on this report and will coordinate with them on managing road conditions during this process.

Project Funding

We have landowners contact us with concerns that the district does not currently have funds allocated to cover the full cost of the project. These landowners are concerned that spending the resources to

import fill material without state funding to cover the shortfall will be untenable and leave the district in a poor situation with stockpiled material and no funding to complete the work. A rough estimate of the current project budget is shown below.

If no other funding is located, the landowners of the district will be on the hook for those costs, an average of \$193 per acre. If this debt is spread over 20 years as allowed by lowa law, that cost would average \$16 per acre per year over that period. There are currently efforts underway with members of the Legislature, lowa Homeland Security, Flood Mitigation Board and Governor's Office to find funds to close this gap.

We recommend the board approve proceeding with import of the fill material as tentatively discussed with the contractor. If the board directs us to proceed with procuring this imported material, we will notify the landowners where the stockpiles are planned and inform them of the process of addressing damages. The contractor would like to begin moving dirt as early as the week of March 13th, making time of the utmost priority. We will ensure the fill is not delivered before the Joint Board can give its approval.





HUNGRY CANYONS ALLIANCE – Dec 2022 Update

The Problem

The Hungry Canyons Alliance (HCA) was formed locally to research and implement solutions to the problem of stream channel erosion and degradation in a 19 county area of the deep loess soils region of western Iowa. Channelization of streams and land use changes during the first half of the 1900's caused stream channels to erode, causing an estimated \$1.1 billion in damages to public and private infrastructure (bridges, culverts, utility lines, etc.), loss of farmland, and increased sediment loads. A 2013 survey of county infrastructure in western Iowa revealed that a total of 415 bridges, culverts, and flumes were still endangered due to stream channel degradation. Golden Hills RC&D in Oakland,



Iowa helped to form and currently provides office space and administrative assistance to the HCA.




Straightened versus meandering stream. (Walnut Creek, Pottawattamie County).

The Solution

A proven, affordable solution to this problem is to build grade control structures in streams. Grade control structures (GCS) at regular intervals help streams stabilize by changing their longitudinal profile from an erosive steep incline to a stable stairstep pattern. Streambed stabilization is the key to preventing further erosion and protecting infrastructure. GCS design is largely dependent on drainage area. Small drainage areas can often be controlled with reinforced concrete box (RCB) or corrugated metal pipe (CMP) culverts with drop inlets and/or flume outlets. Large drainage areas are often controlled with weirs constructed with steel sheet pile driven into the streambed, with a riprap and concrete grout slope immediately downstream, a loose riprap stilling basin downstream of the weir slope, and loose riprap covered banks. Both RCB/CMP and weir designs allow the stream elevation to drop in a controlled setting, restore lost stream grade, prevent further degradation, and reduce streambed slope upstream. This creates a calm backwater condition where silt can settle out, decreasing sediment loads and turbidity and increasing water quality. Sediment re-deposited upstream then helps support formerly exposed bridge pilings and stabilize eroded streambanks.

The Savings

The HCA provides state and federal money available to the 19 counties through a cost share program for grade control structures (GCS). County governments provide a minimum of 20% match for each GCS. Since 1992, the program has provided \$27 million in state and federal appropriations and the technical assistance needed to complete 421 GCS in 19 counties in western Iowa. Another 11 GCS are in progress. These GCS will protect an estimated \$100.8 million in property value. It is estimated that 827.5 acres of land, equivalent to 24.6 million tons of sediment, will be protected from erosion by construction of the 432 GCS. HCA grade control structures, with an average cost of \$66,182,

protect approximately \$233,346 in property per GCS. For every \$1 invested in HCA grade control structures, on average more than \$4.26 of property value and 0.91 tons of sediment are protected from streambed degradation. During FY 2022, the HCA completed construction on eight GCS, and obligated cost share to six new projects.

A second HCA program provides funding to landowners where grade control is necessary to stabilize active gully erosion. This program is funded with the interest earned from state appropriations. This program has built 131 structures, and approved another one, with cost share totaling \$901,426.

The HCA has quarterly meetings at which issues concerning stream erosion and streambed stabilization are discussed. Tours show firsthand which aspects of past GCS designs have worked and which haven't while also highlighting new techniques which can be used to enhance future GCS performance. Regular attendees include county engineers and supervisors, NRCS & DNR employees, SWCD commissioners, consultants, contractors, and landowners.

Over 1,500 GCS of all types have been constructed in 19 western Iowa counties by county governments, the HCA, NRCS, NRCS-EWP, SWCD, Iowa DOT, cities, utility (water, gas, telephone,

electric, etc.) companies, railroad companies, Army Corps of Engineers, Iowa DNR, and landowners. This is the greatest concentration of GCS anywhere in the world due to the loess soils, highly altered unstable stream system, high drainage density, and high road density. With so many GCS located in one area, western Iowa has been referred to as a "laboratory" for GCS design. And because western Iowa is still experiencing streambed degradation, the HCA is one of the unheralded leaders in innovative GCS research, design, and construction.

Matching Federal Funding for Flood Recovery

Heavy precipitation in May 2007 and June 2008, and again in March and June of 2019, resulted in widespread stream channel damage and destroyed county road infrastructure. However, in the investigations that followed, FEMA, NRCS, and county road departments all reported that GCS directly reduced infrastructure and channel damage costs and the number of FEMA program claims, and infrastructure protected by GCS suffered no damage. Although some GCS suffered minor damage, these damages were minimal compared to the potential total loss of infrastructure that could have resulted without the GCS.

Federal NRCS-EWP funding became available after the disaster declarations; so in order to complete as many projects as possible and reduce the counties' burden to 15% match, the HCA provided 10% match (using state cost share) for all EWP projects which provided grade control or were directly associated with existing GCS projects. Between September 2008 and January 2011, 72 GCS projects were completed at a cost of \$12.84 million. The HCA provided \$1.28 million in cost share, the EWP program \$9.50 million, and the sponsor counties \$2.05 million. In 2020-2021, 69 GCS projects were completed at a cost of \$10.66 million. The HCA provided \$1.07 million in cost share, the EWP program \$8.05 million, and the sponsor counties \$1.55 million.

HCA Research

Completed HCA research projects include design of GCS to provide fish passage, use of scrap tires in GCS, aerial stream video and classification of western Iowa streams, factors controlling knickpoint migration, and the use of directional drilling in small watershed GCS projects. Ongoing research projects include experimenting with new bank stabilization techniques and measuring nutrient loads from eroding streambanks to quantify the impact of channel stabilization projects. Partners in these projects include: NRCS, Iowa DOT Highway Research Board, IIHR—Hydroscience and Engineering at the University of Iowa, Natural Resource Ecology and Management Department at Iowa State University, Civil Engineering Department at Iowa State University, Iowa DNR, US Geological Survey, and US Fish and Wildlife Service.



Introduction

The Pottawattamie County Information Technology (PCIT) Department supports the technology that empowers County employees and departments. Due to the many uses of technology, it is important to clearly define the support PCIT provides.

Goal

To define the role of Pottawattamie County Information Technology for both the PCIT staff and the customers they serve.

Definitions

- PCIT The Pottawattamie County IT Department
- Customer A public agency or department entitled to PCIT support by virtue of their position in the structure of the County government, such as defined in Iowa Code, or otherwise authorized to receive support as directed by the Board of Supervisors.
- Peripherals Any electronic equipment connected to a computer (e.g., monitor, UPS, scanner, printer, keyboard, mouse, external hard drive, etc.).
- Department-specific software This is software designed for specific use and not common to other County departments or agencies.
 - An example of department-specific software would be the Recorder's Office software used to index and scan documents.
 - o An example of non-department-specific software would be Microsoft Office or Adobe

Equipment and Systems PCIT Supports

Hardware

- All customer-operated personal computers including desktops, laptops, tablets, MDT's, and their peripherals (see Computer Replacement Policy for more details)
- All computing and networking equipment in County data centers and wiring closets (i.e., servers, storage devices, switches, routers, etc.)
- Server Room and Rack-mounted uninterruptible power supply (UPS) devices
- PCIT will help procure computer peripherals for purchase. Costs of peripherals will be incurred by the customer.

Software

- PCIT will help procure new software. Costs of procurement will be incurred by the customer unless it is part of an enterprise system used by multiple departments. In this case, the cost will become a PCIT expense. Please communicate your plans to PCIT prior to budget season.
- o PCIT will perform client software installations
- Software Configuration
 - PCIT will coordinate with the vendor for vendor-developed software
 - PCIT will configure software that PCIT has developed
- In most cases, customers are responsible to get help directly from their vendor for software support. PCIT staff can be contacted to act as a liaison when the requests to the vendor become prohibitively technical for the customer or when PCIT staff can work with the vendor more efficiently to solve the issue.

Reporting

- o PCIT will direct you to work with your vendor for vendor-developed software.
- PCIT will either develop the report(s) or outsource the work, for software that PCIT supports.
- Network all network related tasks will be handled only by PCIT including, but not limited to:
 - Access to the Internet
 - PCIT will make every effort to ensure reliable Internet access and access to websites are maintained.
 - PCIT is only able to ensure correct operation of web servers that PCIT operates. For that reason, some website problems, after proper troubleshooting of our network, may be outside of PCIT's control. In such cases, the customer may need to contact the third-party who runs the website for resolution.
 - Access to the local area network (LAN)
 - Security of the network (LAN)
- All Desk Telephones and Telephone Systems
- E-mail
 - o PCIT will make every effort to ensure reliable delivery of e-mail to recipients on the Internet.
 - PCIT can only verify transmission of e-mail traffic on servers PCIT operates. In most cases,
 PCIT can confirm whether a message appears to have been accepted by a third-party.

Unsupported Equipment and Systems

- Knowledge of department-specific software and its workflow
 - It is the responsibility of customers to train their staff and ensure they know how to properly use department-specific software.
 - PCIT will field questions regarding department-specific software but may refer the customer to the vendor's customer service if necessary.

Software/Hardware that is unsupported by the vendor will not be supported by PCIT. In most
cases, PCIT will recommend that the software/hardware be replaced when the vendor no longer
offers support of the system. It is the responsibility of the customer to pursue the
software/hardware replacement. PCIT can help with the procurement.

Power/Electricity

o Individual computer UPS devices (battery backup) are to be purchased and maintained by the individual department. IT can provide recommendations.

Network Cabling

- PCIT will contact Buildings & Grounds to add new network cables (network drops) if the request comes to PCIT.
- Buildings & Grounds or Jail Maintenance will handle the request to add new network cables if the request comes to PCIT.
- o In either case, PCIT and maintenance personnel will communicate and coordinate their efforts to best serve their customers.
- Costs associated with network and telephone cabling will be charged to the department unless part of an PCIT project.

• Security Camera Systems

- PCIT does not install security camera systems.
 - Buildings & Grounds should be contacted for help in procuring and installing these systems.
 - Court Security or Jail Administration (depending on the camera locations) should be contacted if the expectation is that they are monitoring the new cameras and responding to incidents.
- PCIT will help connect the cameras and other equipment to the network.
- Cell Phones & Accessories PCIT will help connect the cell phone to County systems, but the cell phone hardware and its accessories and the cell phone plan are not a PCIT responsibility.
- Personal Equipment or Software PCIT will not help setup or configure personally purchased equipment or software unless it is work related. In some cases, Department Head approval will be required.
- Copy Machines & Printers
 - The County has an agreement with a vendor for support, maintenance and procurement of copiers and printers. That vendor should be contacted for help with these devices.
 - o PCIT will help connect the machine to the network.
 - In most cases the ink/toner is provided as part of the Countywide support agreement.
 Otherwise, it is the responsibility of the department to procure and install ink/toner.
 - o IT will help install the proper printer driver for a user or department.
- Equipment purchased without PCIT coordination may not be supported (e.g., A laptop purchased without involving PCIT, may result in an unusable device because it is not compatible with County systems, security requirements, or the network.
- Cleaning of customer equipment such as keyboards, printers, etc. is the responsibility of the department. PCIT reserves the right to refuse excessively dirty hardware.

Equipment Recycling or Sale

 For security reasons, all electronic equipment that contains a storage device, such as a hard drive, must first be processed by PCIT, prior to recycling. PCIT will wipe and/or remove and dispose of the storage device(s).

- If the electronic equipment does not contain a hard drive, then you may contact PCIT for recycling.
- Customers should enter an PCIT ticket to request recycling of equipment.

Discussion and/or decision to approve the Workforce Development contract for FY 24.

CONTRACT FOR WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into the 1st day of March, 2023, by and between POTTAWATTAMIE COUNTY, IOWA, an Iowa Municipal Corporation whose mailing address and telephone number is 227 6th Street, Council Bluffs, IA 51501, telephone 712-328-5600, organized and existing pursuant to the laws of the State of Iowa (hereinafter called "County") and the Council Bluffs Area Chamber of Commerce (herein called the Chamber) whose mailing address and telephone number is 149 West Broadway, Council Bluffs, IA 51503, telephone 712-325-1000.

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, the County desires to purchase certain services from said organization in lieu of hiring additional permanent staff and expending additional County funds to accomplish these services.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto have agreed and do agree as follows:

I PURPOSE AND INTENT

The purpose of this Agreement is to procure for the County and its citizens assistance in developing and promoting workforce development strategies, including the project management of the Home Base lowa and other applicable initiatives as hereinafter described; to establish the methods, procedures, terms and conditions governing payment by the County for such services; and, to establish other duties, responsibilities, terms and conditions mutually undertaken and agreed to by the parties hereto in consideration of the services to be performed and monies paid.

II SCOPE OF SERVICES

A. In consideration for the payment of \$50,000 in accordance with Section III, the Chamber shall provide the following services to the County and its citizens. During the term of this agreement the Chamber agrees to:

- Report quarterly to the Pottawattamie County Board of Supervisors on related activities. Reports will include explanations of why specific activities and programs are undertaken and likely beneficiaries. In addition, the Chamber will keep the Supervisors, individually and/or collectively up-to-date on specific efforts and projects as requested.
- 2) Identify key targeted workforce for specific priorities, marketing, and programs;
- Identify workforce education and training objectives and implement programming to successfully integrate said programs throughout the County;
- 4) Construct linkages with the public, private, and nonprofit sectors, including those businesses and companies located in rural/unincorporated Pottawattamie County;
- 5) Design and implement a workforce education and training strategy. Work with school districts, community college, nonprofits, and other educational partners to do so;
- 6) Coordinate and work cooperatively with other workforce initiatives and/or programs supported or funded by the County and Board of Supervisors as appropriate;
- 7) Conduct ongoing monitoring and evaluation of the program and individual initiatives. Create timely programs and offerings to address regional workforce needs, all while working with applicable partner organizations;
- 8) Work with Pottawattamie County Board of Supervisors, Veteran Affairs, and the Veteran Affairs Commission to successfully administer the Home Base Iowa initiative;
- 9) Design marketing materials for workforce programs and actively market said programs in a variety of ways, including, written campaigns, social media, and print media; and
- 10) Be the main entity responsible for performing or coordinating fulfillment of the scope of services. Advocate at the local, state, and federal level for strategic workforce and talent policy priorities, in coordination with the applicable Committees and stakeholders.

III METHOD OF PAYMENT

- A. Payment for services will be made by County according to the following schedule: July 1, 2023 -\$25,000

 January 1, 2024 -\$25,000
- B. On or before June 30, 2024, the Chamber will provide electronically, itemization of costs incurred. The Chamber will make available all receipts if requested by the County.
- C. The maximum total amount payable by the County under this agreement is \$50,000 as detailed in the SCOPE OF SERVICES (Section II of this contract), and no greater amount shall be paid.

IV FINANCIAL ACCOUNTING AND ADMINISTRATION

- A. All monies disbursed under this Agreement shall be accounted for by the accrual method of accounting.
- B. Monies disbursed to the Chamber by the County will be deposited in an account under the Chamber's name, with a bank located in Pottawattamie County, Iowa. All checks drawn on the said account shall bear a memorandum line on which the drawer shall note the nature of the costs for which the check is drawn in payment, and the program(s) of service.
- C. All costs shall be supported by documentation evidencing in proper detail the nature and propriety of the charges. All checks or other accounting documents pertaining in whole or in part to this Agreement shall be clearly identified as such and readily accessible for examination and audit by the County or its authorized representative without notice and upon request by the County.
- D. All records shall be maintained in accordance with procedures and requirements as established by the Pottawattamie County Auditor, and the Auditor may, prior to any disbursement under this Agreement, conduct a pre-audit of record keeping and financial accounting procedures of the Chamber for the purpose of determining changes and modifications necessary with respect to accounting for funds made available hereunder. All records and documents required by this Agreement shall be maintained for a period of three (3) years following final disbursement by the County.
- E. Unless otherwise required by applicable laws, the Chamber shall allow the County access to books and records for purposes of auditing or reviewing the Chamber's claims, upon request by the County.
- F. The Chamber's failure to provide access pursuant to this section (the entirety of Section IV as contained herein) shall constitute a material breach of the Contract for Workforce Development Services.

V DURATION

- A. This Agreement shall be in full force and effect from and after July 1, 2023, until June 30, 2024.
- B. EXTENSION. If mutually agreeable to County and the Chamber, this Agreement may be extended. Such extension will be documented by written amendment, duly signed and dated by both parties. However, either party may terminate this contract due to non-fulfillment with 30-day's prior written notice.

VI REQUIREMENTS

The Chamber hereby agrees to perform all duties in accordance with all state and federal laws and regulations. The Chamber assures that no person shall on the grounds of race, color, national origin, or sex, as provided by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under this program or activity. Failure to perform duties in accordance with the applicable laws and regulations shall be considered a material breach of this agreement by the Provider.

VII ASSIGNMENT

Neither party to this Agreement may assign, sell or transfer any part thereof to any other firm or entity without first obtaining the written permission of the other party hereto.

VIII

APPLICABLE STATE LAW AND WAIVER OF FEDERAL REMOVAL

This Agreement has been negotiated, executed and delivered in the State of Iowa. The parties hereto agree that all questions pertaining to the validity and interpretation of this agreement will be determined in accordance with the laws of the State of Iowa in Pottawattamie County, Iowa. The parties hereby waive removal of any issue hereunder to the federal courts. This Agreement and referenced attachments constitute the entire contract of the parties hereto and supersedes any prior agreement between the parties.

IX INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

It is understood that the Chamber is an independent professional contractor and that the Chamber will not in any event be construed as or hold itself out to be an employee or agent of the County. It is further agreed that at no time will the Chamber or the work efforts of the Chamber be under the supervision or control of the County, although the Chamber agrees to comply with all reasonable requests and regulations applicable to any other business invitee of the County. It is also agreed that the Chamber, as an independent contractor, is not restricted to working exclusively for the County during the term of the Agreement.

X INSURANCE AND TAXES

The Chamber is responsible for Workers Compensation, Disability, Unemployment, Automobile Insurance, and any other insurance required by the State of Iowa and will provide certificates of insurance to the County on an annual basis. The Chamber is also responsible for payment of State and Federal taxes, and any other applicable tax. The Chamber is not eligible for any benefits the County may provide for its employees.

XI CONFIDENTIALITY

The Chamber agrees to comply fully with confidentiality in compliance with all laws and regulations regarding protected health information.
