RESOLUTION NO. 13-2024

Resolution Approving Amended Development Agreement with JJHP, LLC

WHEREAS, Pottawattamie County, Iowa (the "County"), pursuant to and in strict compliance with all laws applicable to the County, and in particular the provisions of Chapter 403 of the Code of Iowa, has adopted an Urban Renewal Plan for the Heartland Ridge Subdivision Urban Renewal Area (the "Urban Renewal Area"); and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors (the "Board") of the County has adopted an ordinance providing for the division of taxes levied on taxable property in the Urban Renewal Area pursuant to Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa and establishing the fund referred to in Subsection 2 of Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa, which fund and the portion of taxes referred to in that subsection may be irrevocably pledged by the County for the payment of the principal of and interest on indebtedness incurred under the authority of Section 403.9 of the Code of Iowa to finance or refinance in whole or in part projects in the Urban Renewal Area; and

WHEREAS, the County has previously entered into a certain development agreement (the "Original Agreement") with JJHP, LLC (the "Developer") in connection with construction of public infrastructure (the "Project") necessary to support the development of a residential subdivision in the Urban Renewal Area; and

WHEREAS, under the Original Agreement, the County has agreed to provide tax increment payments (the "Payments") to the Developer in a total amount not exceeding \$4,000,000 from incremental property tax revenues derived from the Property; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Developer now propose to amend the Original Agreement in order to (1) adjust the date by with the Developer must submit the Triggering Certification (as defined in the Original Agreement) to the County; (2) update the LMI Amount (as defined in the Original Agreement); and (3) make other related changes; and

WHEREAS, an amended development agreement (the "Amended Agreement") has been prepared to set forth the new understanding between the County and the Developer; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A of the Code of Iowa ("Chapter 15A") declares that economic development is a public purpose for which a County may provide grants, loans, tax incentives, guarantees and other financial assistance to or for the benefit of private persons; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A requires that before public funds are used for grants, loans, tax incentives or other financial assistance, a Board of Supervisors must determine that a public purpose will reasonably be accomplished by the spending or use of those funds; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A requires that in determining whether funds should be spent, a Board of Supervisors must consider any or all of a series of factors;

NOW, THEREFORE, It Is Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Pottawattamie County, Iowa, as follows:

- Section 1. Pursuant to the factors listed in Chapter 15A, the Board hereby reaffirms that:
- (a) The Project will add diversity and generate new opportunities for the Pottawattamie County and Iowa economies;
- (b) The Project will generate public gains and benefits, particularly in the creation of new jobs and housing opportunities, which are warranted in comparison to the amount of the proposed property tax incentives.
- Section 2. The Board further finds and reaffirms that a public purpose will reasonably be accomplished by entering into the Amended Agreement and providing the incremental property tax payments to the Developer.
- Section 3. The Amended Agreement is hereby approved, and the Chairperson and County Auditor are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Amended Agreement on behalf of the County, in substantially the form and content in which the Amended Agreement has been presented to this Board of Supervisors. Such officers are also authorized to make such changes, modifications, additions or deletions as they, with the advice of bond counsel, may believe to be necessary, and to take such actions as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of the Amended Agreement.

Section 4. All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Dear Supervisors:

Thank you for your continued support and participation in the Hungry Canyons Alliance. As of December 2023, 442 Hungry Canyons Alliance streambed structures have been approved for cost share throughout the Deep Loess Region of western Iowa. Pottawattamie County has received approval for or completed 25 Hungry Canyons Alliance streambed stabilization structures with awards and payments totaling \$1,284,044. These structures protect an estimated \$9,317,884 in property value (bridges, farmland, utility lines, etc.). Pottawattamie County has also received \$319,965 in match from the HCA for 25 NRCS-EWP structures. Sixteen private landowner projects in Pottawattamie County have also received a total of \$100,211 in cost share through the Hungry Canyons Small Structures Program.

To date, the Hungry Canyons Alliance has received \$11.94 million from the federal government and \$15.6 million from the State of Iowa. Member counties of Hungry Canyons Alliance have also supported the project, contributing membership fees of \$1,661,500. This strong support allows us to successfully address the problems associated with stream channel erosion in western Iowa. On average, for every \$1 invested in Hungry Canyons Alliance streambed stabilization structures, more than \$4.25 in property value and 0.9 tons of soil are protected from erosion.

To receive funds from Hungry Canyons Alliance, member counties are requested to pay an annual membership fee of \$5,000. Payment of this fee will give you membership in the Hungry Canyons Alliance from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025. An invoice is enclosed.

Unless notified, we will assume that Jeff Jorgensen will continue to serve on the Hungry Canyons Alliance Board of Directors.





This map denotes the approximate location for each of the 28 separate billion-dollar weather and climate disasters that impacted the United States in 2023.

Historic Year of Costly Disasters in 2023:

- In 2023, the U.S. experienced 28 separate weather and climate disasters costing at least \$1 billion, which surpasses the previous record of 22 in 2020.
- The total annual cost reached at least \$92.9 billion, with potential for further increase due to additional cost from the December 16-18 East Coast storm and flooding event.





Historical Context of 2023 Costs:

- 2023 marked the fourth consecutive year with 18 or more separate billion-dollar disaster events, indicating a consistent pattern that is becoming the new normal.
- Over the last seven years, there were 137 separate billion-dollar disasters that caused at least 5,500 fatalities and over \$1 trillion in damage.



Dear Resident:

You have received this letter because your property is in an area that has flooded several times. Pottawattamie County is concerned about repetitive flooding and has an active program to help you protect yourself and your structure from future flooding.

1. Check with the Pottawattamie County Planning Department as to the extent of past flooding in your area. They can tell you about the causes of repetitive flooding, and what the County is doing about it.

2. Prepare for flooding by doing the following:

- Know how to shut of the electricity and gas to you house when a flood comes.
- Make a list of emergency numbers and identify a safe place to go.
- Make a household inventory, especially of contents.
- Put insurance policies, valuable papers, medicine, etc. in a safe place.
- Collect and put cleaning supplies, camera, waterproof boots, etc. in a handy place.
- Develop a disaster response plan See the Red Cross' website: <u>www.redcross.org/services/disaster/</u> for a copy of the brochure "Your Family Disaster Plan."

3. Consider some permanent flood protection measures.

- Consider elevating your house above flood levels.
- Mark your fuse or breaker box to show the circuits to the floodable areas. Turning off the power can reduce property damage and save lives.
- Check your house for water entry points.
- Install a floor drain plug, standpipe, overhead sewer, or sewer backup valve to prevent sewer backup flooding.
- More information can be found in the "Homeowner's Guide to Retrofitting: Six ways to Protect Your House from Flooding" on FEMA's web site www.fema.gov/hazards/floods/lib312shtm.

4. Visit the Pottawattamie County Planning Department for information on financial assistance in terms of a flood insurance policy.

 Get a flood insurance policy - it will help pay for repairs after a flood and, in some cases, it will help pay the costs of elevating a substantially damaged building.

5. Flood Insurance

- Homeowner's insurance policies DO NOT cover damage from floods. However, because Lamar County participates in the National Flood Insurance Program, you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy. This flood insurance is backed by the Federal government and is available to everyone, even properties that have been flooded.
- Any area that is NOT mapped as a Special Flood Hazard Area may quality for a lower-cost Preferred Risk Policy.
- Pottawattamie County participates in the NFIPs Community Rating System.
- Some people have purchased flood insurance because it was
 required by the bank for a mortgage or home improvement loan.
 Usually these policies only cover the building's structure and not
 the contents. Due to the flooding that happens in your area, there
 is usually more damage to the furniture and contents then there is
 to the structure. Be sure you have contents coverage.
- Do not wait for the next flood to buy flood insurance protection. In most cases, there is a 30-day waiting period before the NFIP coverage takes effect.

Contact your insurance agent for more information about flood insurance or to purchase a flood insurance policy. If you don't have an agent, or your agent does not write flood insurance, the NFIP has a toll-free number for agent referrals (1-800/CALL FLOOD)(1-800-225-5356) or the TDD# 1-800-427-5593). You can also get more details about flood insurance at http://www.FloodSmart.gov.

 - Adjoins buildable platted property (not outlots) on rear and sides or property has double frontage.
 - C. Existing parcel is more than four times the minimum parcel size in respective zoning district.
 - D. Does not cause conflict with future access or development to subject parcel and/or adjacent parcels.
- 8.014.020 PRINCIPAL USES: The following *principal uses* shall be permitted in a Class A-4 District: (Ordinance #2004-14/07-01-04)

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors in conjunction with the County Engineer has reviewed the current Pottawattamie County, Iowa, Secondary Road System Roads and has determined that only certain roads are sufficiently improved with a bituminous product that warrants allowing residential development to take place along;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Pottawattamie County, Iowa, Board of Supervisors, that the following County Roads be classified as "Official Bituminous (Sealcoat, Blacktop, Asphalt) Roads" for the purpose of satisfying Section 8.002.200.150 of the Pottawattamie County, Iowa, Zoning Ordinance:
